LESSONS FROM BRANCHED'S FALL 2020 LEARNING SUMMIT: WHAT MSI TEACHER CANDIDATES SAY

November 10-11, 2020, BranchED held its virtual Fall Intensive Learning Summit themed, *"Together We Flourish: How to Show Up for Candidates through the Pandemic and Beyond."* Through BranchED's well-developed sessions, educator preparation program (EPP) faculty and leaders were also able to learn from teacher candidates. In one session, participants were able to hear first-hand comments about what Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) teacher candidates have experienced in virtual teaching environments during the COVID-19 pandemic. These comments about K-12 experiences also inform EPP instruction, providing insight into how the programs can better support the candidates. Here is a sampling of what MSI teacher candidates were sharing:

Rocio Pena, who is earning her Master's in Educational Administration from Texas A&M International University and who is an experienced teacher, explained, "We need to focus on that authentic engagement piece in an online platform. We can't just talk and lecture for 60 to 90 minutes ... It needs to be authentic and meaningful for the kids."

Meena Duguay, candidate for a Master of Teaching degree at the University of LaVerne, mentioned that a number of students started online and really did not know their other classmates. As a result, she assessed, "We need to make time for students to be able to socialize online. Of course, academic



rigor is important, but also having a relationship with your peers is so essential. We have to find ways to make use of those online platforms to do that."

Caleb Franklin, an Alabama A&M University senior majoring in Special Education, told EPP participants, "We have

to keep thinking of new strategies to keep our students motivated, in the classroom, at home and in life in general."

Karla Velarde, a Texas A&M International University candidate for Master of Education and fifthgrade teacher in the Laredo Independent School District, explained that sometimes the online technology is equally challenging for both the student and educator. "One of the things that I shared with my students from the very beginning is don't get frustrated, don't give up and I'm not going to give up on you," she said, adding, "...With all the technology and apps and bells and whistles that have been rolled out in the last couple of months to help us help these students, I was very honest with them from day one. Hey, I don't know this, but I'm going to learn it and we're going to learn it together." Her approach was that being open with students and understanding that they sometimes will be frustrated, intimidated and challenged, was best to be honest and not to "pretend to know it all." Most of all, she imparted, let students know that you are there to learn it with them.

After the Fall 2020 Learning Summit concluded, participant Amber Bechard, Ed.D., an Associate Professor of Education, Chair of the Special Education Program and Associate Director for Literacy and Outreach at the Center for Neurodiversity, Learning and Wellness at LaFetra College of Education, shared, "*I gained valuable insight and connected with like-minded colleagues from across the country. The hands-on tools I gained will have an immediate impact on my teacher preparation classes.*"
