Four Minority-Serving Institutions Across the Country Selected to Participate in Rigorous 3-year Program to Enhance Teacher Prep

Branch Alliance for Educator Diversity launches third cohort of Transformation Center on Sept. 17

AUSTIN, TEXAS — As Americans begin a new school year amid an ongoing pandemic and racial reckoning, equity in education is at the forefront of the national dialogue. A leader in producing high-quality educator preparation programs, <u>Branch Alliance for Educator Diversity (BranchED)</u> launched its third National Teacher Preparation Transformation Center Cohort on Sept. 17 to foster diverse, high-quality educators at four minority-serving institutions (MSIs) across the United States.

Through BranchED's one-of-a-kind Quality Preparation Framework, Azusa Pacific University, Pacific Oaks College, Texas A&M University—San Antonio and the University of North Carolina at Pembroke will spend the next three years strengthening their educator preparation programs (EPPs) to better prepare highly effective and diverse future educators. This research-based framework sets a higher standard for teacher preparation. Utilizing 48 data points, this framework ensures there is improvement throughout the three-year program to cultivate teachers who are capable of addressing students' racial, cultural, linguistic, and economic backgrounds effectively.

"BranchED is dedicated to addressing critical issues of educational equity, and that begins at the institutional level," said Dr. Cassandra Herring, BranchED Founder, President, and CEO. "We know that minority serving institutions train more diverse educators at a disproportionate rate, so we are glad to have these four institutions joining our third Transformation Center cohort to build equity-empowered, high-quality programs. Through this partnership, we can equip more future educators with the tools needed to enter, persist, and graduate as teachers who can implement a high-quality education for all students."

The previous two cohorts attended the launch event to welcome the new cohort into this unique community of practice and shared the transformation their EPPs received through this partnership with BranchED. These cohort connections will serve participating institutions and their respective school district partners by giving them access to enhanced resources and professional development, network with others, share data and learn from each other to move forward with sustainability and innovation.

BranchED's National Teacher Preparation Transformation Center is rooted in the organization's work to redefine what constitutes quality educator preparation. BranchED and its MSI partners are committed to a shared vision that quality and diversity are inextricable. BranchED's larger goals include both diversifying the teaching profession and intentionally addressing critical issues of educational equity for all students.
