



Autobiographical Storytelling



- A form of self-expression allowing us to share our life experiences and reflections with the world.
- Offers a unique window into the human condition.
- Involves introspection, selection, and storytelling, where you transform memories and experiences into a coherent and engaging narrative.
- Making connections and building bridges.



Silent Walk

Goal: To explore who we are as learners and how past experiences have shaped this sense of ourselves.

- How has your sense of yourself as a learner changed over the years?





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

Why Stories Are Influential



- Natural Way of Learning
- Personal Connection
- Awaken Intuitive Knowledge
- Tap the Unconscious

Cognitive Benefits

Why Stories Stick in the Brain





Dual Coding

Brain processes information through two channels: verbal (words) + non-verbal (images) Stories activate both channels (enhances comprehension)



Story Structures

Narrative Arcs provide built-in schemas



Hooks and Attention

Dopamine released Keeps individuals focused

Emotional Benefits



Why Stories Move Us



Empathy Building

Allows individuals to step into the shoes of others and understand their feelings, experiences, and perspectives



Human Connections

Lowers defense and builds trust Strengthens relationships



Memory + Emotional Link

People may forget content, but they remember how a story made them feel Feelings become anchors for learning



Brain Chemistry of Storytelling



Neuroscience

- Empathy Activated: Storytelling activates mirror neurons and emotional processing regions, allowing listeners to feel what others feel.
- Oxytocin Release: Increases trust, empathy, and connection.
- Sustained Attention: Stories engage curiosity and emotion, making them more memorable than facts. The amygdala heightens attention and motivation.
- Multisensory Processing: Stories light up multiple sensory regions of the brain (visual, auditory, tactile, even olfactory), simulating real experiences and deepening comprehension.

- Both Hemispheres Activated: The left hemisphere processes structure and language, while the right hemisphere processes imagery and emotion.
- Transderivational Search: A subconscious process in which listeners project their own meanings, experiences, and emotions onto the story, creating personal relevance. The hippocampus strengthens memory by pairing emotion with experience.
- Full Focus: Attention is not fully under conscious control. Stories naturally capture and sustain focus by triggering emotion and curiosity.






